hoping that I can get enough done on my 1925 to have her on the road as soon as the weather finally turns. While freezing weather prevailed I took up the challenge of machining a new stainless steel water pump shaft and new bushings. Over 90 years of use and abuse makes the pump a continual leaking problem. As opposed to modern style water pumps with modern lip seals, these had a graphite packing that turned abrasive in operation. The assembly has 36 parts compared to about 10 on a modern application. Quite a puzzle to remove and install.

3D PRINTING FOR CAR RESTORATION



Since 3D printing became more accessible I've followed the industry and technology knowing it would be helpful in my restoration hobby. I was just waiting for prices to come down and printed parts resolution to go up. The stars were aligned and I recently decided to jump in.

Home 3D prints can be used for replacement plastic parts or to make forms for cast aluminum or steel parts. A good home 3D printer that prints in plastic can be had for less than \$1,000 and a 3D scanner can be purchased for less than \$2,000. You will need both of these to recreate parts as well as software to "fix" the part in the computer or recreate a missing part from scratch.

There are industrial 3D printers that can print directly in metal, but prices are still way too

high, reaching the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The biggest hurdle to cross for the home 3D printing of replacement parts or forms is the learning curve of the software needed to "fix" the broken part or draw the missing part from scratch so the printer has something to work with. For me just to learn the basics of the software took about 2 solid weeks and I am still learning 3 months in. I am a bit of a computer geek so it may take longer if you are not familiar with software. But like anything else the more you do it, the better you get. You cannot skip this step since the part you need is either broken or gone, though there are companies out there that will do the work and print your part for a price.

My test project was a coin slot on a game of chance where an ear was broken off the aluminum casting. I scanned the part into the computer, "cleaned up" the file and recreated the missing part of the casting. I then printed the fixed part and will use the print as a form to pour a new aluminum casting.





Restoration shops and well known restorers like Jay Leno are using the technology on a regular basis to get that nonexistent part for their restoration. The rest of us will be making them at home or even using a service to have


cataloged parts printed to order. In the not too distant future there will be companies with files of obsolete parts that can be printed on demand. In fact the US military is already doing this for their obsolete parts.

I'll let you know when I make my first Buick part.

Before I retired I had already made several Buick Parts for my 1925 on our school's system. A replacement retainer for the cowl light originally stamped steel that usually rusted away. An escutcheon for a door handle that I had planned on using as a pattern for a brass casting.







Originals had been Die Castings. That system was somewhat problematic and limited. I believe the range was an 8" length. It seemed the feed was always hanging up and the simplest of items took over night to print. In the one class each student was required to develop a AutoCAD Inventor file and produce a part. Technology is to excite the student and most seemed to enjoy the design process and see the finished part on the screen. However, our "rapid prototyper" was anything but rapid. Knowing that their part would take many hours to complete did not impress them any longer. The equivalent of watching paint dry. There was a continual bottleneck waiting for student work to be completed. So I was able to use the system only a few times. Like you I had hoped for a reduction in price and an upgrade in utility.

My last project that a student and I were working on was a rather fragile die-cast part from the AC Speedometers of the time.






I was lucky to find an AC Buick Master unit that had minimal deformation of the part and was able to remove it without destroying it. We made sketches taking measurements with digital calipers and micrometers. Those we turned into an Inventor drawing. (ipt file) Then we found out the true character of the early die cast. Once removed from a stable enclosure the casting changed. Each week we had to reevaluate the present dimensions. We had hoped to print out several prototypes to achieve a final correct fit for the part. Well I retired and still have the files and no replacement part. After all the work on the documenting the part above I was able to find a bad Standard AC unit at Hershey to experiment on. I found out that the drum/pivot support was different in design between the Master and Standard versions. AC Buick Standard version below.







Typical 1920s AC speedometer (Buick Standard unit) with broken and crumbling components. I have yet to find a useable Standard unit to get dimensions from. Many of these parts could have the plastic media used to replace the die cast with equal stability. Back to the drawing board. Larry
